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Programme details



WHAT IS THE MAYOR'S INTERVENTION?

- The Mayor announced an historic £135m emergency, one-off funding plan to help families with the spiralling cost of living by ensuring that every primary schoolchild in London will receive free school meals in the 2023/24 academic year. Rollout took place from September 2023.
- This funding will help up to 287,000 primary school children in the capital receive free school meals and could save families upwards of £440 across the year.
- This emergency funding is for one year only and we will continue to call on Government to step forward and provide the funding to make this permanent.



FUNDING ALLOCATIONS

The number of pupils eligible for the GLA UFSM scheme is taken as the total number of KS2 pupils minus those pupils eligible for the government FSM offer.

It has been assumed that there will be a 90% take-up rate, as evidence indicates take-up of meals is rarely above this rate.

We are funding the price per meal at £2.65 as a single standardised offer across all boroughs, which is above the Government's recently increased rate of £2.53.

The funding allocation is the number of eligible pupils, multiplied by 90%, multiplied by £2.65.

Each borough will have the opportunity to secure additional funding for their schools if they are able to evidence that uptake of the scheme has been higher than 90 per cent.

Boroughs who currently fund UFSM have been allocated funding in the same way - the Mayor has asked that they use the offset funds to support families in financial hardship.

Based on feedback from schools and boroughs, no clawback will be applied to the grant funding.

CONTINGENCY FUND

- The additional £5 m of funding is to act as a contingency for any extraordinary costs associated with the delivery of free school meals in the next academic year.
- This will include helping to provide further funding for kosher meals and exceptional costs for children with SEND.
- Boroughs receive £2.65 per meal. For kosher meals in Jewish state schools, this will be £3.50, a top up of 85p, due to additional costs associated with delivering this provision.

PUPIL PREMIUM

To maintain or increase pupil premium funding, the GLA is encouraging consideration of best practice in promoting registration.

How a borough or school chooses to promote registration is for agreement locally.

Depending on the processes in place in the borough, this is likely be done either centrally by the borough, or by the borough working with individual schools.

We are working with boroughs who are doing autoenrolment to learn from their experience.

We are monitoring pupil premium funding throughout the academic year.

As part of our engagement with schools and boroughs, we will ask them about their approach and take up of pupil premium.

As part of our engagement with families, we have done research on the barriers to registering.

We are running best practice via webinars and guidance

We have sample messaging for comms to families for websites, newsletters, emails etc.

We are preparing a translated form will be available by half-term.

We are supporting schools to expand on their process at KS1 for UIFSM.

We have a pan London messaging to families via the GLA.

Monitoring and evaluation



AIMS AND OBJECTIVES OF M&E PROGRAMME

The Mayor's 1-year intervention is a response to the cost-of-living crisis. This is a primary focus for our evaluation.

Evaluation findings will inform delivery, comms, lobbying and future policy decisions.

- To understand the experience of pupils with protected characteristics.
- To determine the extent to which the guiding principles were adhered to during implementation.
- To understand the levels of school meal uptake, where feasible.
- To support boroughs to evidence higher than 90% uptake of meals in schools, to claim additional funding.
- To inform ongoing communications with boroughs, schools and parents.
- To collaborate with and complement wider partner-led evaluation approaches.


