Tackling Food Poverty in Medway

- Number of households supported with food parcels:
 - 2020 7,654 food parcels delivered during Christmas
 - **2021** 16,357 food parcels delivered during Christmas with an estimate of 27,000 households supported in 2021

2022 - MFP members currently support an estimate of 16,976 households on a monthly basis.

Healthy Start Voucher

In Medway, the uptake of these vouchers was 72% in March 2022 which has improved significantly from being 58% in September 2021

Impact of cost of living on good food enterprises

I run a business feeding 220 families with good healthy food. I employ 4 local people in rewarding jobs at fair wages. And my farm is 72T carbon negative a year. So why am I earning £0 this year; receive just £1,400 in farm subsidy payments, and rely on Child Tax Credits to make end meet? The 'cost of living crisis' is just the latest manifestation of the long running and worsening inequality and ecological crisis.

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

Key policies

- Better regulation is needed to help redress the imbalance of power maintaining the Groceries Code Adjudicator, introducing new, legally binding, sectoral supply chain codes of practice.
- Building new better routes to market for farmers an action plan to increase the market share of shorter and farmer-focused supply chains, public investment in localised infrastructure (eg sorting, drying, hubs); dynamic public procurement models to source from a large range of farmers and growers.
- More transparency in supply chains, greater mandatory reporting and acknowledge the huge overheads in the current, complex system
