#### SFS Timetable



- Adoption of Commission Proposal July 2008
- Council adoption and publication of Council Regulation - December 2008
- Preparation of Commission's Implementing Rules Regulation – first quarter 2009
- Launch of the programme 2009-2010 school year
- A report on SFS implementation to be delivered in 2012



### SFS Conference December 2008



- Gathered over 300 stakeholders
- Networking and idea exchange platform
- Four thematic workshops to provide input to MS strategies and Commission Implementing Rules



### Conference – General conclusions



- Need to strike a balance allow for tailor made programmes fitting local needs but also meeting basic requirements about accountability when using public money.
- Avoid red tape and unnecessary bureaucracy at the same time allowing the schemes to be well controlled

# Conference – recommendations: for action European Commission Agriculture and Rural Development

- Setting up of two expert groups:
  - Expert/scientific group involving researchers in the fields of public health and education to take up an academic, advisory function
  - Consultative/stakeholders group to advise on the practicalities of implementation, exchange best practices and assist in designing and updating an internet networking portal which would facilitate the transfer of knowledge between Member States
- Organisation of conferences/seminars: EU level; regional/national level



## EU SFS main elements



- Voluntary MS participation
- Target group: children in educational establishments – details up to the MS
- Eligible products: covered by the F&V CMO and bananas, except "unhealthy" products to be defined by the Commission – details up to MS (choice of organic, seasonal, local, EU origin products available for the MS)
- <u>Distribution model</u>: details up to the MS (possibility of local/direct purchase)



## EU SFS main elements



#### Four pillars:

- Produce distribution
- Compulsory accompanying measures to make the Scheme effective
- Communication
- Monitoring and evaluation



### EU SFS Budget



- Commission providing 90 mln Euro/year
- EU funds matched by MS funds
- EU co financing: 75 % for Convergence and Outermost Regions; 50% for other regions
- EU funds allocated per MS, on basis of proportion of children in the core target group 6-10, with a minimum of 175 000 Euro/MS



# EU SFS Community financing



- EU financing can not be used to replace national funding for existing schemes (additionality principle)
- Following costs will be eligible:
  - Costs of produce;
  - Costs of produce transport and distribution;
  - Costs for monitoring and evaluation
  - Costs for communication
- No EU financing for accompanying measures



### MS Strategy



- To be prepared at an appropriate geographical / administrative level
- To include the following elements:
  - Budget (EU and national)
  - Duration
  - Target group
  - Eligible products
  - Involvement of relevant stakeholders
  - Accompanying measures
- The Commission will provide guidelines for strategy development
- For the first year MS can present a simplified strategy





- Flexible scheme, recognising differences in culture and administrative arrangements
- Ensuring a wide variety of safe, ready to eat, high quality, culturally acceptable produce
- Encouraging broad partnership bt. education, health and agriculture
- Rules and eligibility kept simple to encourage participation
- Compulsory accompanying measures reinforcing efficiency and sustainability of the scheme
