

Education and Training to encourage and facilitate increased Food production in London

- Lack of practical skills or knowledge in the following groups
 - Workforce
 - Volunteers
 - Public
 - Schools
 - Owners/managers of land
 - Policy makers



London Food ProductionSkills for the "Workforce"

- Need to empower workforce to produce food
- Support novel initiatives to promote "London produce" and encourage productive use of land as appropriate
- Options
 - Commercial horticultural courses
 - Organic production courses
 - Smallholder courses
 - Specialist courses/support for niche markets
 - Viticulture
 - traditional farming techniques
 - Apprenticeships
- LSEB, LSC and Capel keen to be flexible



London Food Production – Skills for the "Workforce (cont.)

Barriers

- Not a Government priority for financial support
 - Not 'full' qualifications
 - Not 'first' qualifications
- not a 'key' sector, CBI, London first and LSEB do not recognise it as a priority
- Sector made up of Small/micro businesses difficult to support training costs or requirements
- Not suitable for traditional Government apprenticeship schemes.



London Food Production -Skills for Volunteers

- Need to work with existing networks to identify and meet their training needs e.g.
 - Federation of City Farms
 - LDA Greenheart for London Scheme
 - Housing associations
 - Volunteer organisations
- Objective is to empower volunteers
 - Possible London wide 'master grower/producer scheme supported by a VLE system?



London Food Production -Skills for Volunteers (continued)

Options

- ESF and similar funding
- Train to Gain funding
- LSC mainstream funding via approved providers
 - Foundation Tier (entry level)
 - 16-18 courses
 - 18+ Full Qualifications
- LSEB, LDA flexible programmes



London Food Production -Skills and knowledge for the Public

- Two levels of engagement
 - General public awareness and engagement
 - Empowering people to grow and produce food

General public strategy to encourage support



London Food Production -Skills for the Public (continued)

- Opportunity for development of skills within 14-19 diplomas;
- Opportunity for more schools to "grow their own";

Barriers

- Lack of skills, desire or ambition amongst general London population or its policy makers;
- Lack of funding for this sort of training/education;
- Lack of developed market or demand for niche 'home grown or local' produce;

Capel Manor College Objectives

- Seeking to meet your education and training needs either directly or by supporting you to deliver them
- Identify key partners to help us deliver our objectives
 - 200 acres mostly organic and open to the public available as a centre to promote London Food education and training network
 - Seek partners to deliver the Master grower/producer network to quality mark producers
