

Transition Initiatives and Sustainable Food Seminar 24 January 2008

Brief Notes

General Issues Raised

- Need to provide mechanisms for replicating projects that work e.g. Growing Communities in Hackney keen to share their model.
- Current lack of networking opportunities within Transition Initiatives nationally. Need to have better communication and opportunities to visit projects / have mentoring / work shadowing/ etc.
- Discussion of web resource held nationally to point people in direction of existing practice and sources of advice and expertise. Noted that Transition Network will be launching a new website shortly that may fulfil some of this need.
- Noted that the Transition Network is still a very young organisation and has been overwhelmed with possible work.
 - Important that the Transition Network support and seek resources for bottom up networking between transition initiatives.
- Transition should be seen as a framework for pulling together existing initiatives not necessarily creating new ones.
- Important to address issues of inclusion in projects and the transition movement. Noted the absence of participation from different ethnic groups in the seminar.

Project Issues

- Difficulty engaging producers in projects.
- The need to keep sustainability at the forefront – local food does not necessarily contribute to sustainability if taken in isolation. Need to keep social issues and resilience at the core of our thinking.

The Role of National Organisations

- May not be possible or desirable to coordinate whole of transition and local food sector nationally. However there may be opportunities for supporting strong local networks e.g. on Food Links model.
- Don't necessarily need national coordination – but there are some functions that would best be performed nationally.
 - E.g. Setting the framework for Transition Groups to influence Local Area Agreements / Local Authorities. Where are the levers for change?

National Funding Bid

- Nervousness amongst transition groups about the move from voluntary based activity into funded posts and what this means for their groups / organisations. Big difference between salaried and volunteer posts.
- Concern about replication of funding bids e.g. national bid might overlap with regional ones e.g. Gloucestershire
- Need to know who is planning what nationally – national organisations need to be open about what they are bidding for.

- Needs to be closely tied in with Making Local Food Work and Local Food Programmes, both being funded by the Big Lottery and starting about now.
- Would like the bid to cover ‘how to....’ Workshops and a ‘matchmaking’ service/mentoring.
- Transition Network will be organising a national conference – could we have a further meeting about this bid at that conference?
